In **1 John 4** we read, "This is the kind of love we are talking about not that we once upon a time loved God, but that he loved us and sent his Son as a sacrifice to clear away our sins and the damage they've done to our relationship with God.... My dear, dear friends, if God loved us like this, we certainly ought to love each NONJUDG other."

In my management career I was always taught that we need a strategy. A plan is essential. I have discovered that Jesus does not work that way in my life. I visited Gallagher Retail Park, Coventry in late Summer 2019 with the Methodist Superintendent. We were looking at retail units as an option for a Circuit office and worship space. The vacant units were too expensive to consider. I noticed a Costa Coffee Shop, so we walked over for a coffee and chat about options. As we sat in Costa drinking coffee, I suggested it would be amazing to have worship in this space. I spoke to the Manager of Costa who loved the idea and within three months **Coffee Shop Sunday** was born with our first gathering on 1st December 2019. We had 22 people in attendance which was great. By the time Lockdown arrived in March 2020 we had 57 people attending. During lockdown **Coffee Shop Sunday** has grown stronger with 269 members in our Facebook Group – an increase of 197 members in five months.

Jesus was with me in Costa, gently nudging and encouraging me to be bold. In my life, doors that appear closed are sometimes not; the door is often ajar. We need to be bold and just try pushing at the door.

We just need to *"speak the word of God with boldness"* and we will be amazed what Jesus delivers. What do we have to lose? Do not plan in so much detail that you miss opportunities – God's timing is perfect.

In his Christmas day broadcast in 1939 (World War II had started on 1st September) King George VI, pondering on what may lie ahead, made the following speech:

I said to the man who stood at the gate of the year "Give me a light that I may tread safely into the unknown." And he replied, "Go into the darkness and put your hand into the hand of God that shall be to you better than light and safer than a known way!"

We too ponder what changes may come but where better to look for guidance than in God's word

Jeremiah 29:11-12 "For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future. Then you will call on me and come and pray to me, and I will listen to you."

The result of real change is found described in Galatians: *"But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control; against such things there is no law"* **Galatians 5:22-23**. The blame game has no part in these Godly fruits.

Proverbs 3:5-6 *Trust in the Lord with all your heart, and do not lean on your own understanding. In all your ways acknowledge him, and he will make straight your paths.*

In the words of the American theologian Reinhold Niebuhr,

"God, grant me the serenity to accept the things I cannot change, courage to change the things I can, and **wisdom to know the difference**."
