1) A Word from our Superintendent Hello Church,

As Christ's disciples, social holiness in our spiritual DNA is no less heightened than our sense of call to demonstrate compassion and assist people in need. For such a time as this, "we do not hope to ease our minds...by shifted blame, while Christ is homeless, hungry, poor". Certainly, our neighbours are affected by unemployment, low wages, rise in the cost of living, the gig economy and shift work, rural isolation, mental health issues etc. I strongly commend the efforts of churches aiming to meet the needs of their local communities - the neighbours of the church – with a demonstration of the gospel in tangible ways. Such churches may wish to share with other churches in the Circuit their transforming Christian practices. Others may actively wait upon the Lord for direction!

Also, in our demonstration of love in practical ways towards our neighbours, we are called to be sensitive to the Equality Act 2010. This asks for specific considerations of the following characteristics: Age, Disability, Sex, Gender Reassignment, Pregnancy and Maternity, Marriage and Civil Partnership, 'Ethnicity', Religion and Belief, and Sexual Orientation. These are known as 'Protected Characteristics'. The Equality Act aims to protect people from discrimination based on certain personal characteristics. As Christ's disciples, we must acknowledge that God has no favourites, how do we then share our lives, in the way we speak, work with people of the and worship, Protected Characteristics? Let's begin with empathy as a dedicated activity of openness to the experience of others.

During this 2022 Lent, while we engage with the disciplines of prayer, fasting, meditation and reflection on the Word, more intentionally, we'll also aim to encounter Christ in our neighbours in need with the required assistance.

5) Covid Restriction Advice

Under the new guidance, most of the previous legal restrictions have been removed with regards to mask wearing and social distancing.

However, there is still a strong encouragement and advice to consider these same practices for "vulnerable people and in situations and who do not normally mix."

Churches may socially mix indoors after a service and have "tea and biscuits etc.". Each church is still strongly advised to think through a safe approach to these matters, and to make local amendments to the church's Risk Assessment currently in force.

Items to be considered in the revised assessment should include:

- Ventilation
- Hand sanitiser stations
- Mask availability
- Changing of signage to "invite" mask wearing and distance protocols
- Serving of wrapped biscuits, sugar and generally raising food hygiene practice in general.
