News from the September 2025 Circuit Meeting

The meeting was at Bedworth and was hybrid. 26 members were present, including 6 who joined on Zoom. Twelve churches were represented.

The Circuit Leadership Team meet on Zoom each Tuesday at 9.15am to pray for the circuit using the circuit map and the prayer for growth on the prayer card now being used in every church. Members of the Circuit Meeting have been invited to join on the first Tuesday of the month.

There will be a meeting to discuss Multi-site Church Councils on Tuesday November 4th at 7.30pm on Zoom. All churches were thanked for sending in their Mission Plans. The review of the Circuit Mission Plan will be the focus of the Circuit Meeting on November 19th.

Rev Doreen Koffie-Williams will be moving on from the circuit in August 2026. The meeting adopted the proposal that we do not go into stationing for 2026, partly based on the belief that we cannot be confident of the funding for the next five years, but mostly because we believe that we are being called by God to review our patterns of ministry for the mission of the circuit, together with the circuit's churches.

Have you ever been to Greenbelt? If your answer is yes, you've probably been more than once unless 2025 was your first time. Greenbelt is a Christian Arts Festival that takes place during the August bank holiday. It is held at Boughton Hall Estate, near Kettering about ninety minutes drive from here, or take the train to Kettering and the free Greenbelt shuttle bus. Greenbelt aims to be eco-friendly.

This year's theme was 'Hope in the Making'. There is a friendly atmosphere which buzzes with fresh ideas but with some realism. The pop-up market stalls include Christian organisations such as Christian Aid; those that campaign for justice such as Church Action on Poverty or offer practical help to people in need such as Homes for Refugees. Some of these also have a venue where they hold talks and workshops.

The Sunday morning service is a huge gathering. Throughout the rest of the weekend festival goers have plenty of services to choose from: various styles of communion, cafe style church, Taizé services or singing hymns with beer in The Jesus Arms. The main Methodist venue, Hope and Anchor, serves non-alcoholic drinks and hosts discussions with a particular appeal for younger people.

Talks cover a whole range of topics from discussions about the future church A.I. justice, peace, women in the Bible ... There are well known and lesser known speakers from those in their early twenties to octogenarians. The music is popular in a range of styles. For light relief there is comedy and performance. This year there was a watercolour painting workshop by the lake. One year I screen printed a tote bag.

Many of the names on the programme I did not know but there were some voices I recognised from Radio 4. One of these was Martin Wroe who presents Thought for the Day. He entertained us for a full hour with his poems. Also in the Wild Goose tent, John Cooper managed to lift our spirits in this wartorn world: 'Making Time For Peace'.

A highlight for me was Bishop Rose Hudson-Wilkin's talk. She fascinated her audience with her alarming life story. She peppered it with her musings on the Anglican church; and some thoughts about what we should be doing as Christians. She said Jesus doesn't ask how many meetings you've attended but rather, 'When I was hungry, did you feed me?' This was reiterated by John Cooper with a slip of the tongue, 'When I was naked, did you feed me?' which illustrates the fact that disadvantaged people often suffer multiple forms of disadvantage.

Don't go to Greenbelt and not expect to be challenged or disturbed. A panel discussion on the justice system included real insights into lived experience of prison especially if you're black or brown. There were lighter moments when we were entertained by Lady Unchained's poems. It was inspiring to learn how prisoners given appropriate opportunities can turn their lives around.

Camping is included in the weekend ticket but you might prefer to stay off site and go in each day or just to buy a day ticket. For those people who can't afford to pay, there are some free places or you can volunteer.

They need plenty of volunteers.



Eco Ideas

Autumn Recipes

We share a few meat-free recipes for you to try: The Season of Autumn provides us with nuts, good alternatives for meat.



NUT RISSOLES

1 medium-sized onion
knob of butter
250g mixed nuts, chopped
125g breadcrumbs, preferably wholemeal
300ml vegetable stock or water
2tsp yeast extract (eg.Marmite)
1tsp mixed herbs
Peel and chop the onion and soften over heat in

Mix nuts and breadcrumbs together.
Dissolve yeast extract in the hot stock.
Mix all the ingredients together
Divide into 12 portions and shape each one into a disc about 7cm diameter.
Fry until golden brown on both sides.
Serve with vegetables.

COURGETTE AND PRAWN LINGUINE

300gm pasta 2 pinches cayenne pepper
oil to fry 1 lemon, zest and juice
2 courgettes sliced 2 big handfuls of parmesan
cheese
garlic to taste 2 big handfuls of basil leaves
300g cooked prawns

Cook pasta.

Gently fry courgettes and garlic, stirring over a medium heat for 5 minutes.

Stir in prawns, pepper, lemon zest and juice.

Season with salt and pepper to taste.

Cook until hot

Drain pasta keeping some of the water, then mix with the prawns, courgettes, parmesan and most of the basil. Serve scattered with remaining basil.

Eco-friendly flower arranging

Floral foam (oasis) contains the same amount of plastic as several plastic shopping bags, is non-biodegradable, non-recyclable and toxic for both humans and animals.
